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Practice What You Preach Sabbatical Notes by Rabbi Cantor Alison Wissot



As a rabbi and cantor, much of what I teach is about how to claim time, how to make holy moments, how to experience the depth of life and not simply let it all pass by unnoticed. We do this through practicing prayer and offering blessings that notice the miracles that happen every day. We do this through study,

becoming aware of the interconnectedness of life and the paths our ancestors have lived before us. I do this sitting in my office guiding families through grief and mourning, or through the happier life

cycle moments of baby-namings or bar and bat mitzvah journeys. I do this fairly well, I hope, with other people's families. And yet one of the major sacrifices of becoming a rabbi or cantor, one that remains unspoken except in the hallway conversations of clergy conferences and conventions, is that our own families often do not receive the same kind of time and energy.

Part of it is the reality that when a family in the community we serve is in need, we of course need to be present; and sometimes, that conflicts with our own family in need. Part of it is the race to accomplish more than will ever be done in a day. Part of it is the feeling that "I've already done this all day long, can't I rest", a feeling shared by doctors and therapists and many others in the businesses of professional giving. None of these things is a sufficient excuse.

This synagogue graces its clergy with sabbatical time, which I had the blessing to take during this past year. In my three months mostly away from Temple Judea (and I say mostly, because I was often spotted in the building in my parental role as Uber/carpool driver), I was able to practice what I preach and teach. When people asked what I was doing on my sabbatical, I joked, "not multitasking." But it was true: I did one thing at a time, gave my attention to whomever needed it in my family, and still managed in to participate in concerts, plan a cantors conference, read, write, study and travel. We went to Shabbat services all over the city, and learned once again just how special Temple Judea is (which is the subject of another article...). And, I got to help my own family work on the holiness of time through living moment to moment in gratitude.

> I will not say this time was easy. Those of us who make ourselves busy in life come to rely on being busy. Stopping, listening, experiencing the world around me moment by moment made me think about things I like so many

others attempt to shut out: existential things, the meaning of it all. I didn't love every moment; but I needed those moments. The demons we all have don't go away because we're moving too fast to notice they're there.

I hope this time has made me a better rabbi. Time will tell. I have tried since my return to keep more of this new pace, to multitask less, and breathe a little more. For all of us, there is a constant reminder in Jewish tradition of the importance of rest, not sleep, but refraining from the busy-ness of work: Shabbat. I gratefully thank the Creator of this universe, who built rest into the fabric of being; now if only we could stop being so darn busy, and claim it.

Grapes, Sticks and Lizards: Curriculum Comes Alive in Our ECC Margie Ipp - Director of ECC Lisa Whitman - Assistant Director of ECC



It was a typical Wednesday in Room E, and children were cleaning up from lunch when someone spotted a grape on the floor. Four-year-old excitement ensued as the kids tried to figure out where the grape had come from, and why it was sitting there all alone. The teachers could have picked up the grape and tossed it in the trash, but instead, they let the drama unfold, and watched as the children gleefully quizzed each other about the mystery grape. Eventually, it was clear that the original teacher-planned curriculum for the day was not going to be nearly as interesting or meaningful to the kids as this emerging mystery, and so, they scrapped their plans and joined the fun. Ultimately, they all sat around in circle time and wrote a class story called "The Mystery of the Missing Grape" which followed their silly adventure. Each child took home a copy of the book, so they could share it with their families.

The teachers in Room 126 noticed that their children really loved searching for and picking up sticks. Every day when they went out to the yard, the kids in their class came back with handfuls of them. The teachers could have said, "Please leave those where you found them," or "Throw those away, they don't belong inside!" But instead, they started a collection. And when it was time to be inspired as artists, they took out their collection of sticks. They made mobiles and sculptures with them. They painted them and glued them. They found creative ways to use their sticks, and because the sticks were important to them, their art had meaning. These are just two very small examples of emergent curriculum that's popping up daily all over our school. Emergent curriculum is defined as "a philosophy of teaching and way of planning curriculum that focuses on being responsive to children's interests to create meaningful learning experiences." It means that sometimes even the best laid plans of teachers might be scrapped if a lizard wanders by the classroom door, or if the children build a school bus out of chairs. Good teachers (and Temple Judea ECC is filled with them!) know that following the lead of children can be the best way to help them become knowledge seekers and life-long learners. Sometimes as teachers we guide, and sometimes we follow. That dance is what makes up a great nursery school education, and we are dancing it every day in the ECC.

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Expanded Religious School Options #Jewishmoments

In *The Wizard of Oz*, Dorothy says, "There's no place like home!" Truer words couldn't be spoken about how I feel to be back at Temple Judea. While many of you don't know me, I was the Director of Education and Rabbi here for 26 years, and I am thrilled to return to this wonderful community.

There are a number of exciting program changes for the coming school year that I want to share with you :

- Classes K-6 are now being offered on both Sundays and Tuesdays. The schedules for both days will be parallel, and if for some reason you can't make your regularly scheduled class, you can attend on the other day (just please send us an email first).
- We are bringing back a prayer and Hebrew program starting in fourth grade, which stresses reading, chanting, recognizing key words, prayer meaning, choreography, and the "drop them in a synagogue on Mars blindfolded" test. Our goal is to create Jews who are synagogue-and home-functioning.
- A new emphasis on community building with lots of programs, opportunities and Shabbat dinners for families to get to know one another.
- Every grade level will have a Tikkun Olam overlay and will be actively involved in projects throughout the year to support a specific mitzvah assigned to their grade (i.e. feeding the hungry, taking care of animals, loving Israel, honoring the aging).

- Seventh and eighth graders will now have 8 days of "learning" and eight days of "doing" to make the world a better place through Jewish values. Class meets twice a month and is offered on Tuesdays and Sundays (and any session you can't attend, you can attend on the other day).
- Judea Teen Journeys is completely new and different for 9th through 12th graders. We are offering an extensive catalogue of classes, with everything from the return of Psychotherapist Richard Weintraub to an inclusive cooking class with students with autism, the Art of the Teen with Theater Dybbuk, yoga shalom worship experience with Jen Quick, a class on preparing for college with Rabbi Spector, and confirmation. And, there are trips: a love, sex and relationships weekend at camp that no teen wants to attend and every parent should make them go to, and a social justice trip to Washington DC with Rabbi Spector. Of course, there is JSTY and the Madrachim teaching program as well. All this and more awaits our teens to keep them engaged in Jewish life.

We are very excited about this coming year and I would love to get to know you. The car pool line isn't a great place to make a connection and build a relationship, so give me a call or send me an email so we can get acquainted over an iced tea (if it's too hot to drink coffee). Temple Judea will be offering Melton's signature two-year program of study beginning October, 2017. This program will be offered on Thursdays, 9:30 to Noon for 25 sessions from October 2017 to May 2018 and again on Thursday mornings following a similar schedule from October 2018 to May 2019. Students who complete this two-year cycle of learning will celebrate a marvelous celebration of their achievement in May or June of 2019.

Taking a Look at Our Governance: iPhone v. Rotary Ellen Fink Israel - President



As President of the Board of Trustees, I am dedicated to uncovering best practices for lay leadership work. I have instituted many new ways of operating including streamlining board meetings so that no one has to bring a sleeping bag to meetings! I encourage board members and senior staff to bring new ideas and templates for our work to my attention. I believe trying new things is a good way to get the creative juices flowing and forces us to be state of the art in everything we do.

As part of that exploration, I have formed a task force to look into our governance procedures to determine if we are operating in the most current and meaningful manner. Under the leadership of Past Presidents Rick Goor and Andy Keimach, we will be researching how other temples run their boards, who is on their boards, how they develop lay leadership, and what their bylaws dictate. While always ensuring traditional fiduciary responsibilities, including oversight, we are looking to emulate best practices, seeking a board that can be more strategic in its thinking, developing leadership roles that are more meaningful, and pursuing a governance structure that will help us move nimbly into the future. We are using the URJ, governance webinars, other Reform Congregations' experiences and direct readings as our resources. We may determine that Temple Judea is currently a state of the art governance model, or we may find that we are a rotary phone; time will tell.

I will keep you updated on our progress.

Where Do Your Dues Go?

Temple Judea depends upon your continued dedication and investment in our community. In all the ways you choose to take part in our community – participating in prayer and study, volunteering on committees, attending worship services, celebrating simchas – your generous financial support is key to our ability to do the important work we do. And beyond our doors, synagogue life is essential to keeping the future of Judaism strong and vibrant.

HERE ARE THE BASIC FINANCIAL FACTS:

It costs the temple approximately \$4300 per household to sustain each family's membership. This includes membership and fees but not school tuition. Our basic membership commitment with fees is \$3640, So, how do we fill this gap? We rely on the Pillars of the Community, the High Holy Day appeal, and other fundraising efforts to make up the difference.

Why does it cost so much to be a temple member? Like most synagogues, more than three-quarters (77%) of our expense are for people – the many people who work at Temple Judea and are dedicated to providing a meaningful experience for you and your family. Some you see, and many you don't. From the clergy to the administration, finance, and support staff, the education team, administrators, the teachers and specialists, and the maintenance staff, it takes many people to make Temple Judea operate each day.



How can you help? Most important is that we ask you to pledge as much as you can to help us cover expenses. Another important way of helping sustain Jewish life in the future is to bring in new members. Invite your friends to one of our Shabbat services, tell them about our schools, share how Temple Judea is bringing Jewish moments to your family's life.

As we celebrate our 65th year, we have a great story to tell. Temple finances are just one part of the story. As always, if you have questions, we are here to answer them.

Theatre Dybbuk: Our On-Site Theater Company By: Barri Worth Girvan, Board of Trustees

Have you found your way to the Lewis Building on our campus? You might be surprised to learn that Theatre Dybbuk, an innovative Jewish performing arts group, calls Temple Judea home and is making good use of this space. Since 2016, they have been our "theater company in residence," creating Jewish theater experiential and educational events for our participation, learning and enjoyment.

Theatre Dybbuk offers artistic performances for a general audience, told from a Jewish perspective. In other words, they create theatrical pieces based on Jewish folklore and history with dance and expressive movement. They operate with a three-pronged approach providing: (1) theater productions and shows, (2) educational programs that incorporate storytelling, and (3) launching community and synagogue collaboration, with local partners like Temple Judea, Valley Beth Shalom and Hillel 818. Partnerships like this are a win-win, because Theatre Dybbuk utilizes office and meeting space and rehearses on-site when schedules permit, while Temple Judea benefits from their educational programs for kids and a couple of events and programs they produce each year in collaboration with our synagogue. You might even remember the S'lichot event they did last year.

They develop all shows in-house, spending anywhere from six months to two years on the creative process. While they are busy developing shows, they find educational ways to bring artistic expression into Jewish life. It's a relatively small theater company, with a staff of four, and 10 associate artists and seven educational facilitators.

Through a partnership with the Jewish Federation, they received a Cutting Edge Grant two years ago and have continued to expand their programming. Over the last year they have performed for large audiences of 500 or more at iconic spaces in L.A. like Grand Park and UCLA, and they have been the "Pick of the Week" in the Los Angeles Times.

Why are they called "Theatre Dybbuk?" Artistic Director Aaron Henne describes it as folkloric and mythic with a mysterious quality that honors our Jewish history, while still appealing to wider audience across cultural boundaries.

They are currently getting ready to premier in the winter of 2017/18 with their newest piece, "Lost Tribes," a show about race, identity and community belonging, which will debut at different locations throughout the community. Keep an eye out – you might see them rehearsing on campus. Make sure to stop by and visit them, and stay tuned for their performance dates so you can catch them in action.

For my last Judean article as president of Women of Temple Judea, I would like to give a special thank you to the WTJ board for all of their hard work, as well as all of the women and men who supported our efforts throughout the last two years. I am pleased that we were able to bring you such diverse and interesting programs, and support Temple Judea in the process. Getting involved is what it's all about, as it makes our Temple Judea experience that much more meaningful. For anyone who is looking to give back, make new friends, and create meaningful Jewish moments, please join us. Going forward, we have some great events planned, which will be under the leadership of WTJ's new president, Aime Friedman. Please join me in welcoming her. This is her message to all of you:

"To those of you who don't know me, my name is Aime Friedman and I am thrilled to be involved with such a wonderful group of ladies who do great things for our Temple. I invite each and every woman of Temple Judea to come help us help Temple Judea. This year we have more great events scheduled, and we would love to have you join us."

Judeans for Justice Harry Sherman - Co-Chair

"Social Justice and Advocacy are among the central tenets of Reform Judaism." – ReformJudaism.org

Now is the best time to become a social activist at Temple Judea. Judeans For Justice has recharged our efforts to bring about positive change in our community. Along with our partners, OneLA and Reform CA, we have some important and exciting actions to report.

We have agreed to organize and teach citizenship classes to immigrants in the San Fernando Valley and beyond, and are looking for a large congregational participation in this action. You can take an immediate, active role in helping the more than 359,000 green card holders in L.A. to obtain their citizenship and avoid deportation. This action began at the request of Mayor Garcetti after he met with some of our group members.

Judeans for Justice is helping to organize the first San Fernando Valley Interfaith March from select houses of worship in our area to show solidarity and unity in our neighborhood. The march is scheduled for Sunday, September 10 from 2pm to 5 pm.

We are advocating for several state legislative bills to improve civil rights, the environment, women's rights and healthcare. Among those bills are SB54 - Stop Requiring Law Enforcement to Share Data with ICE; SB49 - The California Environment Defense Act; SB180 - Lesser sentences due to prior convictions ;and AB42 - Affordable Bail Act. We are working with the Religious Action Center to reach their goal of meeting with 50 state legislators to build relationships and advocate for the bills.

Judeans For Justice gets it's strength through our partnerships with OneLA and Reform CA. OneLA is the largest and most diverse broad-based organizing network in Los Angeles County, with more than 65 member congregations and nonprofits. It is affiliated with the Industrial Areas Foundation (IAF), the oldest and largest national organizing and leadership development network in the United States. Reform CA is a project of the Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism. They organize across lines of race, class, and faith for a more just and compassionate California.

Think about what issues inspire you and join us in the process of bringing tangible change to your community. Our meetings are the second Monday of every month at 7pm at Temple Judea.
