Fourth grade religious school class, bat mitzvah, standing under the chuppah in the newly renovated outdoor chapel... these are a few of the pivotal moments that stand out when I think about how Temple Judea has impacted my life. I'm not alone – almost every member of our community has experiences that have drawn them closer to synagogue life and made them feel more connected.



At a time when so many people feel disconnected in the unpredictable world around us, Temple Judea is a place where we can connect. And to our credit, it is also a place where we can grow and evolve.

Passover: Seven Days or Eight Days? Cantor Yonah Kliger

Have you ever wondered why some people celebrate seven days of Passover while others celebrate the "traditional" eight days?

It can be confusing. Especially since the Torah tells us that we are to celebrate for seven days, while most garden variety calendars that you can pick up at your local Ralphs will tell you that the holiday lasts eight days. You'd think that since it's so clearly stated in the Torah, there would be no further questions. Alas, you know what they say about Jews and opinions...

The reason for this discrepancy comes from way back, when the months of the Jewish calendar were figured by the new crescent moon. A rabbinical court in Jerusalem would bless the new month based on the testimony of people who claimed they witnessed this moon. Since a lunar month is roughly 29.5 days, a Hebrew month would last 29 or 30 days.

The court would take time to get the word out to the rest of the Jewish population, which was typically done using fire signals. Later, the Cutheans, a group that opposed the rabbis, burned signal fires on the wrong days-just to throw people off!

Now that the fire method couldn't be trusted, the rabbis began sending messengers to deliver the news in person. This proved to be even more difficult and took much more time. So much more time, that people in faraway communities (such as Babylonia) would often receive the message too late, and therefore wouldn't know when the new month had begun.

So, just to be safe, they decided to observe each Yom Tov (Holy Day) for two days instead of one. This way, at least one of the days would reflect the holiday. In the case of Passover, it meant that the actual Yom Tov was not only the first and seventh days, but was now the first and second, and seventh and eighth days. Therefore, Passover became an eight-day holiday.

So what do we do now? Well, most Conservative and Orthodox Jews in the Diaspora continue the custom of celebrating an eight-day holiday. However, Reform Jews, along with most Jews in Israel, celebrate only seven days. After all, with the technology we have today, there should be absolutely no question as to when the holiday begins.

Whether you choose to uphold the custom of eight days, or adhere to the Torah's commandment of seven, I hope you have a liberating and meaningful Passover.

Brene Brown's book, *Rising Strong*, is not a parenting book, and it's not a book about child development. It's a book for adults about resilience – about being brave in your life, inevitably falling down, and picking yourself back up again with grace and a little self-awareness. And yet, a quote in *Rising Strong* struck me as the true reason that we do what we do every day in the Early Childhood Center. The quote on page 216 says,

"We can't be brave in the big world without at least one small safe space to work through our fears and falls."

It's a powerful statement. It says that in order to be brave, to take risks, to learn, we have to have a safe place where we ten," however, THE MOST IMPORTANT THING they will learn at school is that it's okay to try and fail, and try again. Our teachers are here to let them know that sometimes they will win, and sometimes they will lose, and on both days they will be supported and celebrated. Our goal is to create that "small safe space" for children to work through their fears and falls so that they can be resilient little humans who know that there's a difference between making a bad choice and being a bad person.

Through our group discussions in the Parenting Center, and our daily one-on-one conversations with Nursery School parents, we are trying to let families know that encouraging our children to try and letting them fail is actually a gift. If we can show them at this young, pivotal age that we've got


Brotherhood Dean Piller and David Daniel, Co-Presidents
