Water Play! Margie Ipp - Director of ECC Lisa Whitman - Assistant Director of ECC

Summer is coming, and one of the things we are most excited for in our ECC Summer Session is an abundance of water play. As we all know, playing with water can keep kids cool in the hot valley summer, but educationally it does so much more than that. What are the benefits of playing with water at school and at home this summer?

Sensory Input - Playing with water provides lots of opportunities for great sensory input. All of our senses can get involved when we touch, taste, feel, smell, and listen to water. How does it feel when we dunk our hands and feet in it? What does it sound like when we pour it from one container to another? Does it taste cool on our tongues from the water fountain? Does water smell like anything? These are the kinds of questions that are being answered each time the children explore.

Fine Motor Development - When children fill up one cup with water and pour it into another, they are practicing much needed fine motor skills and hand-eye coordination. Squeezing a squirt bottle increases hand strength, and pinching an eye dropper develops the pincer grasp. Both are necessary pre-cursors to holding a pencil and writing.

Language Development and Social-Emotional Growth – Water play is a perfect way to talk and interact with friends. As children talk to each other about their play, they are navigating social relationships. Is it my turn or your turn? Do you like to be splashed? Can I use that sponge now? Language develops as children communicate in new ways associated with their play, and teachers monitoring play can help expand vocabulary by introducing new water words like damp, moist, soaked, and saturated.

Math & Science Education and Problem Solving - Water play offers many opportunities for math and science learning. Do items sink or float? How many toys can fit in the basin? If I move the hose, how does it affect the path of the water? The concepts of full, empty, more, and less are also easily observed through water play. All of these concepts are building blocks of higher math and science learning.

> There will be lots of water play and learning happening this summer in the ECC Summer Program, and also in our fantastic Camp Zehut program. We encourage you to let your children explore and play with water at home too. Make sure children are well supervised, and prepare yourself to get wet!



Teaching Our Children: The How, What and Why Rabbi Bruce Raff - Director of Education

In the last issue of the Judean, I shared that the philosophy of our religious school can be summed up in three words: FUN, MEANINGFUL and MEMORABLE. We want our students to enjoy their time at Temple Judea, and to experience a sense of community and connection in a place that is nurturing, safe and comfortable.

These ideas are the philosophical underpinnings for the vision we have created for the school: seeing Judaism as personally relevant and that the lessons of Judaism offer valuable tools to living a better life. It is our hope (and expectation) that our families join us in this important endeavor, and work in partnership with our religious school team.

Our goal is that our children develop the competence and confidence to:

- Understand the Jewish traditions they have inherited through the generations and their responsibility as keepers of those traditions.
- Be connected to one another and understand the positive value of relationships made at the Religious School as part of a synagogue community, and to see temple affiliation as having positive value. Be connected to the larger Jewish community locally, nationally and internationally, and to have developed a connection to the land of Israel.
- Understand that, as Jews, they have a responsibility to make the world a better place and to engage in Tikkun Olam to repair the world.
- Live their lives with an understanding of themselves, of others, and of the world guided by reform Jewish teachings, ethics, and values.
- Master a set of competencies, as reflected in reform Jewish practice, including:
 - Understand how to observe and participate actively in Shabbat, Jewish holidays, rituals and traditions.
 - Know and study Jewish texts, especially Torah.
 - Be able to read and understand the essence of "prayer book Hebrew" and use everyday Hebrew sayings.
 - Have a basic understanding of Jewish history.
 - Be aware of current issues affecting the Jewish people.
- Engage with God and deal with difficult theological questions.
- Develop meaningful individual and communal prayer.
- Be proud Jews.

That's our philosophy. That's our goal. That's our purpose. That's what Religious School at Temple Judea is about. If you know someone you think would benefit from such a program, have them join us in this fun, meaningful and memorable task of creating Jews.

Tali Tadmor: An Inside Look at the Magic Behind the Music By: Barri Worth Girvan, Board of Trustees



Tali Tadmor is the renaissance woman behind the keys – piano keys, that is – who delights our ears with beautiful music every Friday night. It is no accident that as congregants, we are transported from a hectic week to embrace the serenity of Shabbat through the music that Tali, our instrumentalists and our clergy, bring to our sanctuary each week. We hear the end result, but raw talent, creativity, passion, artistic

skill, and plenty of rehearsals are the recipe for the superb sound that our services incorporate. And it should come as no surprise that Tali's resume reflects her immense talent that she shares with us at Temple Judea.

A math major at UCLA, Tali never thought she would have a career in music and originally pursued it as a hobby to help get her through college. At the age of 21, our former Cantor, Susan Caro, saw Tali perform and brought her to play at Temple Judea. Tali credits Cantor Caro with giving her a shot, and over 18 years later, Temple Judea remains her home.

Not only has Tali had a career in music, but it has been an illustrious one. She went on to receive her Doctorate in Keyboard Collaborative Arts from USC, and she has performed at Carnegie Hall, Walt Disney Concert Hall, and with famed Maestro Placido Domingo in the Los Angeles Opera. She heads the Collaborative Piano program at CSUN, and holds faculty positions at the California Institute of the Arts (CalArts) and the LA Opera. On top of all of that, she is the Music Director at Temple Judea.

Tali plays at every Friday night service, b'nei mitzvot, High Holy Days and the special events and concerts like the Judea Bowl, Purim Spiel, and preschool graduation. She works closely with the many ensembles at Temple Judea, including the adult choir that performs at High Holy Days, and she coaches the cantors-in-training (CITs) and children's pop-up choir. Behind the scenes she rehearses with our instrumentalists for an hour before every service.

Music has become an increasingly significant part of our worship experience at Temple Judea over the years, and it is not an illusion that the sounds have become so much richer. In addition to adding regular instrumentalists, we enjoy improved acoustics in the sanctuary and a sound professional on site, which is now standard at each service. Tali credits Rabbi Aaronson with not only his strong support for the music program, but says his leadership has been key in garnering the necessary resources to make it successful. She also adds that it was Rabbi Cantor Wissot's vision to incorporate more music, and this became a reality with our instrumentalists, two full-time cantors, our multiple choral ensembles and our robust CIT program (and it doesn't hurt that we have a Senior Rabbi who plays blues guitar and prioritizes the music program).

Tali describes the most rewarding part of her work is Friday nights when she gets to play from her heart. Originally from Israel, she loves pouring her soul into the music of the service.

"I am most at home when I am behind the piano at Temple Judea playing in my mother tongue," she said. "I feel unconditional love from the congregation and feel so fortunate that people respond to whatever I put out there. I am grateful to and love Temple Judea."

The Big Fill: A Humanitarian Mission Jennifer Lutzky, Social Action Chair

The Social Action Committee was privileged to participate with other Los Angeles area synagogues in The Big Fill on April 8, a day of sorting and packing donations headed to civilians, especially children, affected by the civil war in Syria. Save The Syrian Children, a nonprofit started by a local Jewish couple, solicits donations of medical supplies and clothing to ship directly into the neediest parts of the country.

Temple Judea was a collection site for local donations of food, clothing, diapers, and medical supplies. All supplies were then transported to Temple Emanuel of Beverly Hills, where the community worked together to sort and pack supplies. Volunteers from Temple Emanuel, Honeymoon Israel, Wilshire Boulevard Temple, Temple Israel of Hollywood, Temple Beth Am, and other synagogues packed more than 10,000 items into more than 80 shipping boxes. Each box had to be inventoried and labeled with individual contents. Volunteers worked cheerfully to accomplish the task and went home knowing they had done a small part to help an extremely vulnerable population. At the start of The Big Fill, one of the organization's founders, Philip Koosed, spoke about how his organization is able to get into some areas which bigger NGOs, like Unicef, cannot access, and how small amounts of supplies can be the difference between life and death for some patients.

Save the Syrian Children has built a network of doctors working in Syrian hospitals, who provide lists of most-needed supplies. The organization then solicits donations from local hospitals or sources them directly from suppliers. Working with Turkey and Israel, the supplies eventually land in warehouses where doctors from 28 hospitals can access them.

Special thanks to Temple Judea and our Social Action members who dropped off supplies, transported the donations, and helped sort and pack. For more information about Social Action and a calendar of volunteer opportunities, please visit our web page at www.templejudea.com/social-action.





Did you know that there are a half a million people in the Los Angeles area who have green cards and therefore might be eligible to become citizens? At the suggestion of Rabbi Aaronson, Judeans for Justice formed a partnership last year with Our Lady of Grace Church to help green card holders become America citizens. We are one of the few organizations that provide this service for free.

Our volunteers lead classes that assist applicants through the entire process, beginning with their application – a complicated 20-page form -- to teaching them what they need to pass the citizenship test. During the entire process, each applicant has a mentor who helps with whatever issues arise; we currently have four classes in progress.
