When my wife Kim and I had our daughter, Sarah, my mother had a recommendation. Actually, she had lots of recommendations -- she's a Jewish mother -- but this one was particularly memorable: Mommy & Me at Temple Judea.

That surprised us: I'd grown up at Stephen Wise Temple, and my parents were still members there. But my mother, a teacher and children's bookstore owner, knew the area schools and synagogues, and she was firm: Judea had the best early education program.

At Mommy & Me, Kim and Sarah made friends they still have today. And bit by bit, Judea became our spiritual home. A High Holy Days sermon by Rabbi Karen Bender about her responsibility to the congregation's non-Jews brought my Gentile wife to happy tears: no one, at any temple, had ever been so directly, respectfully welcoming to her. I enjoyed the services and other programs, but I wasn't sure where I fit in.

Urged by my wife and Steven Mayer (an old friend from Stephen Wise), I checked out Brotherhood. The first meeting was painful: my sides hurt from laughing. This was a gregarious, dedicated, and hilarious group of guys who didn't take themselves too seriously, but placed great value in their community. They played poker and volunteered at Operation Chicken Soup, flipped burgers at the Purim Carnival and ushered at Shabbat services. Soon, I was going on retreats, serving Thanksgiving dinner to the homeless, and engaging in boisterous, meaningful debates. I blinked and found myself the group's Secretary; I blinked again and, with a friendly shove from Ron Milman, found I was Co-President.

That put me on the Board of Trustees, another revelation: lay leaders passionately engaged in making Judea the best it could be. Learning how the various moving parts of such a large temple work together has made me appreciate everyone, from the senior staff to the custodial staff, who helps make Temple Judea so successful, and so special.

Things change: Sarah had her Bat Mitzvah, and is now a high school junior. After years of entreaties, my parents finally joined Temple Judea, where they've found their own wonderful, welcoming community. And, of course, the rabbis who led the congregation we joined have been succeeded by the current clergy, each of whom has contributed their own passion and knowledge. As for me, this is my fourth and final year of Brotherhood Co-Presidency, and on the Board of Trustees. Knowing that will make each meeting, each encounter, each time I marvel at someone's talent and dedication that much sweeter. Being involved makes services more meaningful, friendships deeper, and membership more valuable. That's my recommendation: get involved.

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

Some people do. Some people spend their days planning this year, next year, five years from now. Where you'll vacation in 2025. Where your kids will go to college. What the 5- or 10-year plan looks like for your career.

And then there's that moment -- when you are rerouted to somewhere you didn't expect to be, and don't want to dwell. Does that mean we shouldn't plan at all? Just leave it all to chance because plans will be broken and some of them will dissolve in pain and hurt?

Perhaps you saw an emailed story making the rounds a few years ago. It was the tale of a traveler boarding a plane for Paris. This traveler had spent hours and weeks and months planning the details of the trip, pouring over pictures of the city, reading all the travel blogs and articles about the best ways to see Paris. And then, the plane lands... in Amsterdam. The traveler is grounded there, and is told he will never get to Paris.

What does he do? He spends the first part of his time in Amsterdam angry and wounded, bitter and feeling like life has let him down. And then, something changes. He walks along the canals, and they strike him as downright fascinating. He begins to explore this new city he had no exposure to before, and finds himself opening up to the beauty around him. He falls in love with Amsterdam.

It is a parable, a metaphor, for a much broader idea: life. Some of us do eventually get to Paris, and have the joy of seeing both places. Some stay in Amsterdam. Some find their journey there leads them to a completely new place they have never heard of before. But only if we're willing to let go of the plans we made and see the beauty of where we are.

We hear a lot of talk about "living in the moment." Allowing the detours and random experiences and really listening to them can help us experience the beauty of now. Sukkot is a holiday designed for this, because we are in the middle of a hut, bringing nothing material with us. We bring only the meals we need for sustenance, and the people important to us, into that sacred place. We dwell for a while there, in the now, in the beauty of what we have even if that is next to nothing physical in this world.

On the other hand, we have the story of Joseph, which we read in December. Joseph teaches us that we have to plan, that if we do not, we will not be ready for the famine that inevitably comes. Prepare yourself, and the opportunity will come, he teaches us.

Thanksgiving and Chanukah too are holidays of gratitude, for where we are right now, but also stories of the tremendous planning and effort that went into creating the nations of which we are a part. We are reminded to stand up for this nation, to battle for religious freedom everywhere, fight for our values and to honor the legacy of those who fought before us with our gratitude and humility.

So, as we journey through these next few months, I hope you reflect on that balance. Prepare yourself. Work to make plans that will save your family, yourself, from the struggles of the future. But also just sit with where you are, allow yourself to be in the beauty of Amsterdam, even if you someday see the blessing of Paris as well.

The Temple Judea ECC has proudly been promoting our play-based curriculum for years, and it hasn't always been easy. Questions like, "When are they going to start learning things?" and "What do you mean they JUST play?" are typical from parents who are understandably trying to make sure that their children have the best possible education, and do not "fall behind." Our belief in the power of play in early education has just been backed up by neuroscience research and officially recommended by the American Academy of Pediatrics. In articles that ran in papers across the nation, pediatricians confirmed that the "wonder drug" that "could enhance a child's creativity, critical thinking, and resilience" is free, and easily available, and it's called PLAY.

So, what does a play-based curriculum look like? Does it mean that when you drop your children off at school the teachers just sit back and watch them play? The answer to that question is yes . . . and no. A play-based curriculum means that teachers create an educationally rich atmosphere in which children can make choices, explore, and learn through play. Sometimes it is free play, which means the children have the freedom to take the things they find and create

in any way they want to, with no expectation. Sometimes it's directed play, which means that the teachers set out items to explore with a goal in mind. Sometimes free play can turn into directed play. When children decide to line up all the chairs in the room two by two and pretend they are on a bus going to the zoo, teachers have the opportunity to talk about transportation and the different ways people get from here to there; or they can suggest that some children build a zoo out of blocks, which could lead to a discussion of the different animals in the zoo; or they could write a class book about all the things they saw on their pretend bus ride. The learning possibilities are endless, and within the play children have the opportunity to make choices, solve problems, navigate personalities, deal with disappointment, and celebrate success. It's the whole package!

The Temple Judea ECC is proud of our commitment to play-based education, especially now that research shows that kids in play-based early learning programs "end up equally good or better at reading and other intellectual skills, and they are more likely to become well-adjusted healthy people." And what could be better than that?

A Tale of The Wall of the Schools Religious Schools

I share this story (borrowed from Temple Beth El of Cedarhurst) to illustrate how important the role of parental attitude is when it comes to shaping student perceptions about Religious School. As his Bar Mitzvah approached, Michael's parents asked how many extra parts in the service he could do. Jonathan's parents asked if he had to recite so much Torah, because after all, his school never taught him to read Hebrew.

Michael went to the best of religious Schools. Jonathan went to the worst of religious schools.

Michael and Jonathan were in the same class.
